Course Goals

Course Description

This course provides a rigorous study of Greek syntax with consideration of passages throughout the New Testament as well as study of a portion of one or more New Testament books.

Relationship to Horizon's Mission

The course equips ministry leaders by fostering competence in reading the New Testament in its original language.

Course Competencies and Learning Outcomes

- Develop and demonstrate an intermediate-level grasp of Greek syntax and will demonstrate by preparing detailed syntactical analyses of selected texts in the Greek New Testament.
 - Assessment: Class Preparation Worksheets and Textbook Readings
- 2. Acquire a working vocabulary of Greek words that appear 18 times or more in the New Testament.
 - Assessment: Morphology Review, Vocabulary, and Principal Parts Quizzes
- 3. Expand translation proficiency in select passages of the New Testament.
 - Assessment: Class Preparation Worksheets and Final Exam
- 4. Reflect on the significance of careful translation for life and ministry.
 - Assessment: In-class participation and discussion

Course Assignments and Activities

1. Vocabulary Quizzes (25%).

Throughout the course, there will be weekly vocabulary quizzes, which will be administered every Thursday through Populi. You must complete each quiz before 11:59PM on the due date.

2. Morphology Review Quiz (5%).

This quiz will be sent to students on Friday, May 21. The quiz will be completed by the students without help from any resources by Sunday, May 23. It will be comprised of three main sections: parsing, word formation (declension and conjugation), and principal parts. On the quiz, you will be asked to affirm that you did not look at the questions before you sat down to write the quiz, and that you did not use any resources.

3. Principal Parts Quizzes (10%).

Throughout the course, there will be four principal parts quizzes that will be based on the chart found in Mathewson and Emig (291-96). These quizzes will be administered during class.

- **Due dates:** Quiz 1 –May 31; Quiz 2 –June 14; Quiz 3 –June 28; Quiz 4 –July 5.

4. Class Preparation (35%).

In preparation for class discussion, students will be responsible to complete a series of worksheets (worth 35%) focusing on the syntax of these texts, but with particular reference to our preceding class discussion. Students are responsible for any discussions of the texts they are analyzing in Mathewson and Ballantine Emig. On days when we have syntactical

discussions, students should come to class, having carefully worked through the *class notes* for that day and having referred to Mathewson and Ballantine Emig as necessary.

5. Final Examination (25%).

The final examination will be comprehensive and will require translation and syntactical analysis both of texts we have examined together and of other texts. This exam will be proctored.

General Guidelines for the Submission of Written Work

Formatting Papers

- Papers should be typed, double-spaced and follow the appropriate formatting guidelines (e.g. 1 inch margins).
- Follow the <u>Horizon Format Guide</u> consistently.
- The length of papers should fall within +/- 10% of the stated length. Papers that fall outside the length guidelines may not be graded and will receive a grade reduction.

Failure to follow these guidelines warrants a grade reduction.

Submitting Your Assignments

Assignments should be submitted via <u>Populi</u>. Late Assignments and Extensions

Academic Honesty

Horizon uses the University of Saskatchewan definition of plagiarism described as "the presentation of the work or idea of another in such a way as to give others the impression that it is the work or idea of the presenter. Adequate attribution is required. What is essential is that another person have no doubt which words or research results are the student's and which are drawn from other sources" (Office of the University Secretary, 2012). Students are expected to give due recognition to sources from which all substantial phrases, sentences or even ideas are drawn. Class Attendance
